To navigate the inherent tension between international contract law and domestic public finance, the representation utilized a highly sophisticated, dual-track legal strategy. First, recognizing the international dispute resolution community's strong preference for the sanctity of the contract, the defence secured major commercial victories through rigorous, black-letter interpretations of the contract's core mechanisms. By establishing the absolute **conditionality of testing and commissioning prerequisites**, the defence proved that **technical non-compliance legally precluded project handover**, successfully justifying the withholding of over USD 100 million in security funds. Furthermore, enforcing strict jurisdictional limits on the dispute resolution board completely defeated the contractor's claims for legal costs, while exposing critical mechanism failures regarding the Engineer's *ultra vires* variation orders issued in breach of express financial authority caps.

Second, to protect a massive USD 500 million sovereign audit objection against rigid procedural time-bars, the defence purposefully deployed a novel "**Statutory Shield**" argument as a complementary public-law defence. By arguing that supreme constitutional mandates governing public funds cannot be entirely estopped by standard private contract mechanics, this multi-layered advocacy successfully ring-fenced the State's massive sovereign claims, officially preserving them for final international arbitration.

- Appeared as Lead Counsel in multiple arbitral proceedings regarding Power Purchase Agreements (PPAs) for diesel and furnace oil-fired power plants. Key issues argued included the calculation of "dependable capacity," liquidated damages for performance shortfalls, and regulatory compliance in the energy sector.
- Represented a party as counsel before an arbitral tribunal in a similar PPA dispute involving a furnace oil-fired power plant, addressing issues related to performance shortfalls, non-compliance with contractual capacity requirements, and claims for liquidated damages.

Successfully represented the respondent and argued before the Hon'ble court. The Hon'ble Court observed that "whether the provision of section 22(4) is mandatory or directory, the law is Well settled. When a particular law does not suggest any consequence of the non-compliance or any particular requirements, it is merely directory: ..."

- **Civil Revision: on the rejection of an application for appointment of arbitrator under section 12 of the Arbitration Act, 2001 in the absence of any arbitration clause in the agreement.**

Mr. Mohammad Abdul Wahab Vs. and Kashba Housing Private Limited and Ors. reported in Manupatra [LEX/BDHC/0187/2022](#).

Successfully represented the Appellant (Mr. Wahab) in an interesting matter involving the rejection of an application seeking the appointment of an Arbitrator by order of the Learned District Judge, where the agreement, concerning real estate disputes, executed between the Parties, did not include any such Arbitration clause as such, in the first place.

The Hon'ble High Court following perusal of all relevant laws, submissions, and pleadings by the learned counsels opined that "the learned District Judge upon misconception of law as well as upon



misreading and misconstruing the total scenario of the dispute arose between the parties, rejected the application summarily, and as such, it has committed an error of law, in the decision occasioning failure of justice calling interference by this Court.”

- **Civil Revision: on the rejection of an application for removal of the Chairman of the Arbitral Tribunal under section 15(2) of the Arbitration Act, 2001.**

Metro Homes Limited Vs. Umee Kulsum and Ors reported in Manupatra [LEX/BDHC/0006/2023](#).

Appeared on behalf of the Respondents/Defendants in the Civil Revision, arising from the Arbitration Miscellaneous Case No. 59 of 2021, wherein the learned District Judge upholding the submissions made had dismissed the Misc. Case; for appointing a new Chairman of the Arbitral Tribunal, due to the grounds that the Case (Arbitration) was at the “stage of passing award so there has been no reason to remove the chairman of the Arbitration Tribunal”)

The Hon’ble High Court in the Civil Revision, following perusal of all documents, Orders from the Arbitral Tribunal, and submissions of the learned counsels, observed that as the opposite Parties had arrived at a “consensus” with the learned counsel for the petitioner and made a common submission to the effect that, “if a chairman is appointed replacing the incumbent one, then a time frame be given to the chairman to be nominated on the concurrence of the parties so that the arbitration proceedings can be started from the stage where it had finally been ended.”, the Hon’ble Court was pleased to set aside the impugned Order dated 10.04.2022 passed by the learned District Judge, Dhaka in Arbitration Miscellaneous Case No. 59 of 2021 and make the Rule absolute.
